A Message from the Chief Pharmacy Officer

I am glad to present to you the Fiscal Year 2021 report for the Department of Pharmacy. This is our first Duke University Health System (DUHS) Pharmacy report. This year brought unique challenges as we faced a global pandemic that impacted our lives in many ways. I am extremely proud of the resiliency and determination of our pharmacy team. We did not waiver in our commitment to care for our patients, our loved ones, and each other. In the support of our vision to be a global leader in pharmacy care, our team supported scholarship and research activities with more than 66 peer reviewed publications, grants, and abstracts presented. In support of our mission to deliver exceptional pharmacy service for a healthier tomorrow, our Population Health team made 5,300 patient, caregiver, and team member contacts to optimize medication therapy and patient care.

As we all did our part to help battle the COVID-19 pandemic, we prepared and administered 370,000 COVID-19 vaccines, bringing hope and protection to many. The Duke Compounding Facility prepared more than 500,000 sterile products to support patient care across DUHS. Our Investigation Drug Service had a productive and impactful year managing 551 active protocols. The Duke Children's Hospital and Health Center pharmacy team supported the design and construction of our first fully autonomous central pharmacy in the Duke Central Tower. Our inpatient pharmacists and technicians processed and optimized 4.7 million medication orders across the system.

To continue to focus on being good stewards of our resources while managing the additional financial pressures of the pandemic, the Pharmacy Utilization Management Program (PUMP) realized \$6,300,000 in savings across the health system. In support of our formulary and medication management efforts, the Center for Medication Policy coordinated 100 medication formulary reviews and the Medication Safety group investigated over 7,900 adverse drug events.

As we continued to focus on providing excellent pharmacy services across the continuum of care, the Duke HomeCare and Hospice pharmacy team made 26,000 medication deliveries to our patients at home. The Outpatient and Retail Pharmacy teams filled 460,000 prescriptions. They enrolled over 3,000 patients in patient assistance programs to make their medications more affordable. The Retail Pharmacy team through our system Meds to Beds Program delivered 26,000 prescriptions to the bedside, putting crucial medications in the hands of our patients and providing medication education at the time of discharge.

These are just some highlights of the many accomplishments the DUHS Pharmacy Team had in Fiscal Year 2021. We have much to be proud of, and I applaud you all for your magnificent work. Thanks to each of you for your perseverance, dedication, and contributions to the care of our patients.

We look forward to the work ahead as we continue to manage through the pandemic. We will continue to focus on system integration and alignment as we are *One Pharmacy, One Team, One Standard of Care for all Patients*.




